Some questions were adapted during the process to add fluidity during conversation, but all topics that the questions addressed were included in each interview (translated from original form, see Appendix Section C for original questions in Spanish).

Patient Interview Questions:

- A. Describe your Name, Age, Type of Work, type of Insurance
- B. Please describe your medication usage.
 - a. Are these medications easy to obtain? Is your medication regimen easy to follow?
- C. Do you believe that medical care is easily accessible in Tirrases? (Yes, No)
 - a. Could you elaborate about your personal experience with the EBAIS centers? Details may include time to clinic, waiting time, appointment time, and any costs incurred
- D. Are you comfortable discussing your treatments and medication usage with your doctor?
 - a. Do you believe that you have a positive and open relationship? If not, how could this be improved?

- E. Are there existing stereotypes or preconceptions about medication usage? For example, 'medications contain many dangerous chemicals', 'medications cause negative side effects', etc.
- F. What are your opinions regarding the use of natural medicine?
 - a. Have you used this kind of medicine previously? If so, why?

Medical Practitioner Interview Questions:

- A. Can you describe your role here in the EBAIS, and what kind of patients you work with?




Fig. 1. Comparison of patient reported level of comfort when discussing their medications and illnesses with their medical practitioner between insured and uninsured populations.




Fig. 2. Percentage comparison of prescription medication usage, natural medication usage, non-prescribed medication usage, use of Doctor prescribed medications, and chronic illness reporting in insured and uninsured populations of patients.




Fig. 3. Comparison of frequency of doctor visits between insured and uninsured populations




Fig. 4. Comparison of sources of medical advice used by patients between insured and uninsured population.
